



Systems of provision: restrictions and chances



Free stores: dependency on preceding systems of provision; restricted field of needs covered

Urban gardening: voluntary work in small spaces, not enough output to feed many

Concurrency to existing systems of provision

Broadening form of practice, e.g. combining with repair cafés or clothes swapping party

Niche or transformation?

Radiant image, inspiration to take food production into one's own hands
